

Report to the Community

Dear Friends,

After the hard winter of 2015, a milder 2016 revived the longer-term trend of increasing library usage, with a 6% increase in visitors, a 3.6% increase in materials borrowed, and a whopping 34% increase in public program attendance.

The Friends of the Library funded many of those popular programs, along with discounted passes to museums and cultural institutions, to the tune of \$33,000 this year. The TCPL Foundation provided just over \$50,000 in grants to support early literacy, digital literacy, and lifelong learning initiatives. Over 300 people volunteered at the library over the course of the year, providing nearly 13,000 hours of their time.

We could not do what we do without so many friends in the community who generously donate hours, expertise, and money to support great library services. Thank you!
