Friends of the TCPL Bookstore

The media sale in early September was a resounding success. In fact, it was one of the best sales weeks at the bookstore going back to our original opening in 2011. The first week went so well that we successfully repeated the sale the following week! Weekly bookstore sales are still below pre-pandemic levels, but there are positive signs of a rebound.

Our cookbook sale is ongoing and will continue through the end of October. We expect to bring out holiday and gift books for Christmas and Hanukkah, along with holiday media in early November. New this year, we have prints available of the TCPL that are suitable for framing.

The bookstore's 11th anniversary is coming up on Saturday, November 5. In celebration, we are planning on having some giveaways every hour.

Historically the bookstore has accepted payments in cash and in limited cases, checks. We are studying the feasibility of accepting payment via credit and debit cards, which we expect will be a great convenience to the growing number of customers who live in the increasingly cashless world.

TCPL Garden Notes

Beds *Drought*. This is a frightening word and up until now, the home gardeners of New England have been mostly spared the challenges of drought. During this Summer of 2022, folks who are not even gardeners were well aware of the high heat and absence of rain that we experienced.

When I became a homeowner in Quincy, my mother gave me a very useful gardening book called The Weekend Garden Guide: Work-Saving Ways to a Beautiful Backyard by Susan Roth (1991). Roth argued for including drought-tolerant plants and shrubs to save time. Gardens are meant to be enjoyed and are not meant to be drudgery. I confess that I call myself "frugal" and I loved the idea of saving time and money. Early on, I defaulted to "drought-tolerant" plants for any garden beds that I planted. "Xeriscaping" was a concept then in use way out West in places with dry and infertile soil. Gardeners were encouraged to use native grasses, perennials, and succulents. Including native plants in our gardens is fundamental to maintaining our local ecosystem for supporting insect and bird populations. Pronounced "zee-rah-scaping," the word is a derivative of the Greek word "xeros," which means dry. In landscaping terms, xeriscaping means using slow-growing and drought-tolerant plants to conserve water and establish a wasteefficient landscape. Perhaps you have noticed the proliferations of grasses and succulents available to home gardeners? Try 'em, you'll like 'em.

The flower beds at the TCPL have irrigation systems for which we are profoundly grateful. Without those systems, I doubt the Friends' Gardeners could have lasted as we have. Still the beds are large and there are sections that are out of range of the irrigation systems. During the especially dry weeks, I brought up my hoses and watered the parts of the beds that were parched. The long summer days

gave me plenty of time to access and appreciate the beds in the quiet hours early in the morning or after 5 pm on a Friday night. From the beginning of the building of The Friends' Gardens, we chose reliable, drought-tolerant perennials such as Sedum "Angelina", Nepeta, Echinacea, Rudbeckia, Heuchera, Lavender, Irises, Baptisia, Asters, Russian Sage, Hostas, Grasses, Montauk Daisies, Cranesbill Geraniums, Calendula, and Veronicastrum.

Because of the irrigation systems, we have the luxury of planting annual flowers which are grown to bloom only for one summer. The pansies planted in the spring by the Broad Meadows Middle School were followed by hot pink *Vinca*, white *Dipladenia*, and the yellow *Lantanas*. They are still giving a show as I write.

Gentle reader, please accept a garden hint. "Drought Tolerant" plants are not a free pass to skip watering. New plants need to be watered regularly until they are established. (This might take a couple of years.) Beware the paradox of over-watering. If you water your plants too much then they set shallow roots which will be weak. Let the plants set deep roots and you will have a strong plant. (Methinks there is a moral there...) I want to thank all the Friends and patrons who have been so supportive this year. There were a few awfully hot days when we, my garden partner Mimi Balsamo and I, truly appreciated the compliments and the encouragement!
