Letter from President Catherine Lynde

Dear Friends,

The Friends of TCPL will meet in the Community Room of the main library for our Annual Meeting at 7:00 pm on Tuesday, May 14. Local culinary educator Adam Centamore will be giving us a delightful "History of Chocolate and Its Production." He is a well-known author who has made numerous presentations about food, wine, pairing wine and food, and, of course, chocolate. He'll also give us a taste of the really, really good stuff. This should be a wonderfully entertaining evening!

Prior to the chocolate, starting at 6:30 pm, we'll have our Annual Business Meeting of the Friends. We'll ask approval for new terms for some of the Executive Board and for our Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Budget. We'll also spend a few minutes bringing you up to date on the changes in the last year.

As you may already know, we lost three valued members of the Friends this past winter: Betty Malloy, Bill Mackey, and Harold Crowley, who together had close to 100 total years of volunteer work for the Friends – especially for the Bookstore. We are in the process of acquiring a plaque to honor and commemorate them, which will be placed in the Bookstore.

I hope you have noticed the successful relocation of the Bookstore and the expanded hours. There are now about fifty volunteers trained to staff the Bookstore. We have also seen our revenues rise substantially – both because of the move and the expanded use of electronic payments. There are now paperbacks in the atrium that are available even when the bookstore is closed (payment is on the honor system). There is also a bin in the atrium where you can leave donations of gently-used books and CDs.

<u>In Memoriam</u>

In December 2023 and January 2024, the Friends lost three people who were instrumental in making the Friends the group that it is today. They are remembered for their generous acts of service for our community. We will miss them.

Harold Crowley was a founding member and the first President of the Friends of the Thomas Crane Public Library. He also served on the Board of Trustees for the Library. He was dedicated to improving the services and programs offered at the library and the impact that this could have on our community. Harold helped the Friends to organize a permanent bookstore at the library and enjoyed his time volunteering in the Bookstore and on the Bookstore Committee.

Bill Mackey served as a long-time Friends board member and was an integral part of the Bookstore operations. Bill generously volunteered his time sorting book donations and working in the Bookstore. He acted as a liaison between the Bookstore and the Friends Board, reporting each month on events and themed book sales that would be happening in the bookstore. Bill was an avid reader of historical nonfiction and took a special interest in this section of the bookstore.

Betty Molloy was a member of the Friends Board and served as our Board President from 2011- 2014. She was a founding member of the Bookstore Committee and cared greatly for the service that the Bookstore provided to our community and for the programs that the book sales funded. She took a special interest in children's books and carefully arranged this section of the bookstore. Each bookstore anniversary was an important milestone for the Friends and Betty would see to it that it was celebrated.







TCPL Garden Notes

OUR "MESSY" WINTER GARDENS EXPLAINED

Regular patrons of the Library may have noticed that the Flower Beds were not tidied up this past fall. This was a deliberate choice, since climate change has required us to reconsider our relationship with our planet and our very local patches of it. A garden is alive with insects and birds in addition to flowers, so we left the fall perennials such as *Anemones, Asters, Echinacea, Rudbeckia,* and *Sedums* with their seed heads aloft for birds to eat. We chose not to rake up fallen leaves so as not to disturb the beneficial insects that shelter under it. Some of the dead dried plant leaves and stems provide nesting materials as well.

Mimi Balsamo and I will be starting our 13th season as stewards of the library gardens very soon. Ecological concerns have required us to rethink how we garden. When we began, it was customary to tidy up flower beds and set them to rest for the winter. We would cut back perennials to the ground, rake and bag as much as we could. We are learning that we do not always have to dominate but can learn to coexist with our natural world. Knowing what we know now, we are glad that we never got in the habit of using pesticides at home before we started gardening here.

March is always a frustrating month for New England gardeners who are itching to get outside to turn the soil and plant. We know that a late season blizzard is always a possibility although that did not come to pass this year. Spring is here... Hooray!
